Since the 2000 Census, the U.S. Census Bureau conducts the American Community Survey, which annually tracks demographic, social, economic and housing data for states and highly populated areas.

Most of the information called for in these pages is available through the Census Bureau website. Some Census Bureau data is available to download in Excel tables. For data that is not available through the Census Bureau's website, we suggest a resource where you might find the data.

Despite the number of pages here, there is more data available about the population in your community. We suggest that you record and consider the population data that influences the health and well being of a community and that is relevant to the nutrition and physical activity needs of a community.



Analysis of Data: Given the nation's troubling situation on health disparities between White, non-Hispanics and other racial and ethnic minorities, this population data is essential for you to consider. Some racial and ethnic minority groups have higher rates of some chronic diseases than other groups. For example, African Americans and Mexican Americans consistently report a higher prevalence of obesity compared with the White, non-Hispanic population. Compare the distribution of your community population among the different racial and ethnic groups with how the state population is distributed. Does the community have an unusually large percentage of a particular race or ethnic group that is at an increased risk for nutrition-related and physical activity-related diseases, and that should warrant focus?

Analysis of Data: The community's economic profile can indicate special health service needs. For example, individuals with higher incomes tend to have more behaviors that reduce the risk of overweight and obesity (Mancino, Lin, and Ballenger 2004). Or, an area with a high concentration of poverty could increase the risk of food insecurity. Likewise, a community with a high percentage of children on free and reduced school meals may need more or better access to nutrition and physical activity programs.
